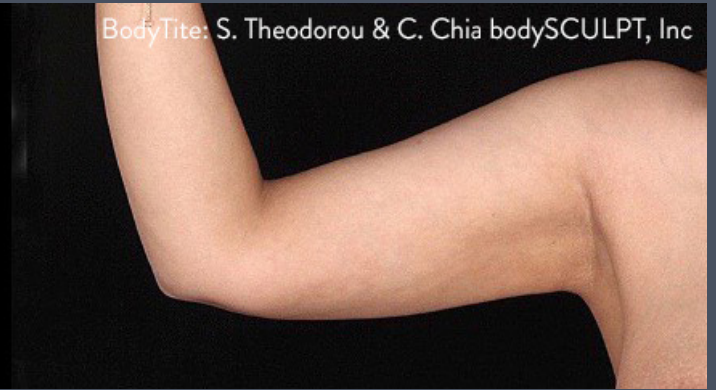

WHAT IS BODYTITE?

BodyTite, is a cosmetic technique offering a less invasive alternative to traditional liposuction. Using cutting-edge radiofrequency-assisted liposuction (RFAL) technology, BodyTite eliminates excess fat and tightens the skin. The procedure involves placing a small tube under the skin to deliver radiofrequency energy that melts the fat for easier removal and boosts collagen and elastin production for firmer skin.

BodyTite is a popular choice as it combines fat removal and skin tightening in a single treatment. Unlike traditional liposuction, which focuses mainly on fat reduction, BodyTite precisely targets the soft tissue, contouring the area while also promoting skin tightening.

The deep heating gently stimulates skin tightening in the target area. As a minimally invasive procedure, BodyTite requires only a small incision and can be performed under local anesthesia. After the procedure, patients are advised to wear a compression garment for four weeks to aid recovery and minimise swelling.

What does BodyTite Do?

BodyTite procedure is an effective fat reduction surgery in several parts of the body including but not limited to, the abdomen and arms. How long does it take to heal from BodyTite?

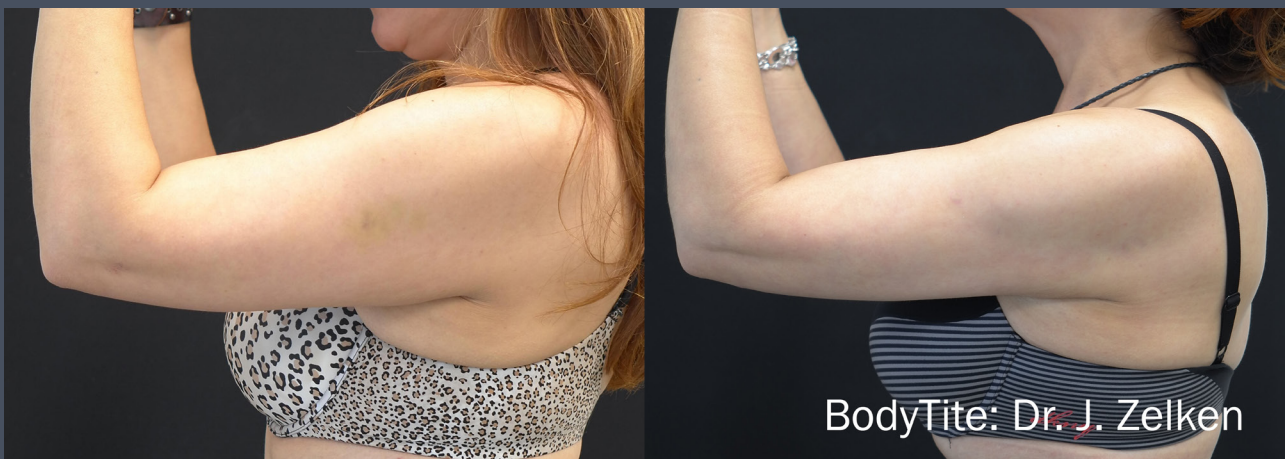
Like every surgical procedure, you should expect some discomfort and tenderness. This tends to last up to 2 weeks. Following the procedure, you will wear a compression garment for 4 weeks that will vary depending upon the areas that have been treated.

Does BodyTite help cellulite?

BodyTite tightens the skin while simultaneously eliminating the excess fat and cellulite.

Is BodyTite permanent?

Results from a BodyTite radiofrequency assisted liposuction procedure should be permanent. However, as in any fat reduction procedure, this will only be the case if you continue to maintain a healthy diet and lifestyle following your treatment. BodyTite does not and cannot prevent future weight gain.
